The Florida Rights Restoration Commission is a group of over 50 individuals from the state and national organizations dedicated to removing the civil rights ban from the Florida Constitution. Florida's civil rights ban is one of the most restrictive in the entire country. A felony conviction in Florida results in the loss not only of voting rights, but also the right to serve on a jury and hold public office. Loss of civil rights also makes a person ineligible for many state-issued occupational licenses. In Florida, a person with a felony conviction permanently loses his or her civil rights until they are restored by the Board of Executive Clemency. Restoration of civil rights (RCR) in Florida can take months or years.

Florida member organizations provide assistance to people seeking to restore their civil rights in Florida. The FRC also lobbies the Clemency Board and the legislature for RCR reform, and creates public awareness of Florida's civil rights ban.
